Builders of the Future Program Launched

The Builders of the Future Program is a unique vocational program that offers students the opportunity to study in Carpentry, Electricity and Plumbing Competencies at the First Nations Regional Adult Education Center (FNRAEC) in Kahnawà:ke. The program will be offered to Kahnawa'kehró:non on an annual application basis for the next four years. Each program cohort will accept 8 students. This 4-year program will expose students to 3 trade programs, with the end goal of having students enter directly into the workforce or return to

school to complete

Each program cohort will be 6-months long. Students will gain approximately 600 hours of study in Carpentry, Electricity and Plumbing competencies, followed by potential work placements in these fields.

S.T.E.A.M Camp

Tewatohnhi'saktha launches its first S.T.E.A.M Camp for Youth aged 12 to 14 years old with funding in part from Des Cultures Renewable Energy. S.T.E.A.M stands for Science. Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics. The Up & Atom Science camp is the first of four-sessions that will run until summer 2026, and possibly longer. The overall objective of this initiative is to encourage and better prepare Kahnawà:ke's youth in achieving greater participation and success in the S.T.E.A.M. fields in academia and the labor market.

This one-week camp introduces youth to different S.T.E.A.M. related careers in and around the community. The camp will include fun day trips to expose youth to the various fields. "It's an exciting initiative, that will hopefully result in more Kahnawà:ke youth going into S.T.E.A.M related careers! This is

only the first session, each year we'll build and grow, creating opportunities for youth to

explore the field of S.T.E.A.M.," said Emily Rice, Workforce Development Counselling Services Manager, who is overseeing the project.

"It is a great honor to be part of this youth educational project! The seed of the S.T.E.A.M. Camp project was planted as early as 2018, at the birth of the Des Cultures Renewable Energy Partnership. And here we stand, 5 years later, assisting at the birth of this seed as one of many examples of our solid, collaborative and long term relationship," said Jean Roy, President, Des Cultures Renewable Energy.




70 students hired under the Kahnawà:ke Summer Student Employment Program!

The Kahnawà:ke Summer Student Employment Program (KSSEP) saw its twenty third year in the summer of 2023. A record number of 133 employer applications for summer student positions were received this year. A variety of high-quality positions were made available to students, ranging from the typical seasonal positions such as Onake Camp Counsellors and Heads Up Facilitators at Tewatohnhi'saktha, to brand new positions such as a Digital Marketing Intern with Laflesche and a Project Assistant for the North American Indigenous Games through the Sports and Recreation Unit at the Mohawk Council of Kahnawà:ke. The KSSEP received many new requests for innovative and unique positions in 2023, which

Green Corn Agricultural Fair

On August 19th, Tourism teamed up with Kahnawà:ke Collective Impact to host the Green Corn Agricultural Fair. It was a nice event to showcase the community's gardening skills. Sturgeon was prepared by Eric 'Dirt' McComber, a local fisherman. The Food Sovereignty Action Team served bite size traditional food samples for visitors to enjoy. Goats and chickens were on site to teach people how to properly care for them.

With 417 visitors in attendance, four (4) participants entered the homemade jam competition, with Tekaronhiahkha:sions Rice winning 1st place for her strawberry jam and 2nd place for her raspberry jam. Dave McComber and members of Iontionhnhéhkwen Wilderness Skills showcased survival skills; everyone enjoyed learning how to make a fire

using different materials. Elaine Delaronde shared traditional plant knowledge with the participants. Compost Council of Canada was also there to talk about the importance of composting.
