## KAHNAWÀ: KE TOURISM CELEBRATES 10 YEARS!

Did you know that the Kahnawà:ke Tourism Development Project began in 2012? Basing the research and ambitions around the canonization of Saint Kateri Tekakwitha, community members, organization leaders and council chiefs came together to create a plan of action to bring back tourism in Kahnawà:ke. At that time, the market results were to focus on religious, aboriginal, cultural, heritage and educational tourism segments.

The Kahnawà:ke Welcome Center building opened in December 2013, with the hiring of the Tourism Development Agent. The grand opening to the public was held on June 26, 2014. There were many vendors, tours of the building, trivia and discussion about how tourism would grow here in Kahnawà:ke. The goals of the Tourism Development Initiative were to foster a center for artisans to display

their work. enerate and oversee multi-year tourism elaborate strategies, increase and on Kahnawà:ke's product/service tourism offering, assist in further enriching the product/service offerings, and to form relationships with regional, provincial and national tourism associations.

Currently, the Kahnawà:ke Welcome Center welcome visitors to our community, directing them to key destinations, assist in coordinating visits and encouraging shopping and dining at some of our fine restaurants. Over the years, signage was created and installed, leading to the Welcome Center for all their information needs.









#### Kahnawà:ke Tourism Celebrates 10 Years!

In the past 10 years, our office has welcomed approximately 9,864 visitors. The tourism team has developed many guided tour options including the Saint Kateri Tekakwitha Shrine, the Kanien'kehá:ka Onkwawén:na Raotitióhkwa Language and Cultural Center, a tour of the community, dance shows, traditional meals, and craft workshops.



The Kahnawà:ke Welcome Center has coordinated 509 tours since creating the tour options. The center has employed a roster of 20+ local tour guides and currently employs 5 full-time & 3 part-time employees. In our 8th year we developed our first strategic plan, and did a comprehensive community survey; setting the tone for how Kahnawà:ke wanted tourism to develop.

Community Partnerships are so important to our team, working together to increase the tourism offering as well as to create a more tourism market-ready environment. In doing this, we participate in many activities, committees, events, and multimedia publications (Shop Kahnawà:ke Map [print & digital], Tourism Guide, Brochures, art on sale by consignment, special events, tourism website & tour app [2022]). As well as leading 4 food festivals a year with a cultural flare: the Maple Food Festival, Strawberry Food

Festival, Corn Fest and Harvest Food Festival. These are geared for local businesses to increase traffic flow, shopping locally, and to offer more traditional foods throughout the year to our visitors. Our team also sits on many local boards ensuring we are helping our community thrive.



Partnerships with The Saint Lawrence River Shrines tour circuit, the What's your story marketing campaign, the Musical Park Project, app project, longhouse project, and celebrating the 300th anniversary of settling in Kahnawà:ke are all other notable projects worthy of mention. We must not forget the guidance and mentorship from Indigenous Tourism Quebec and the Indigenous Tourism Association of Canada.





Our team has been fortunate to travel to the Rendez-Vous Canada and Bienvenue Quebec marketplaces, many powwows, cultural events such as KWE, and many others, all while representing our community.



#### Kahnawà:ke Tourism Celebrates 10 Years!

Moving forward, we are collaborating with our local businesses to create new tourism products and hope to offer free tours to our school children in fall 2024. We are seeing the tail-end of our 3 year strategic plan, which includes creating the Tourism Advisory Board, a junior tour guide program, completing special projects transitioning to a new plan with Tewatohnhi's aktha for the next 5 years. Kahnawà:ke Tourism will be a part of the new Cultural Arts Center, primarily running the welcome kiosk, leading and organizing the guided tours, supplying the tour guides and coordinating special events.

"I've just finished teaching a one-week intensive graduate course at Concordia University in the Department of Applied Human Sciences.

Last week the students and I went to Kahnawà:ke and took part in the Tour of Kahnawà:ke as part of the course, which focuses on systems change. As all of us live on unceded Kanien'kehá:ka land, and it is the land on which we work/aim to work, we wanted to deepen our understanding of the land, history and culture.

Our guide was Davis and he shared of himself and his time so generously, answering our many questions even after the time for the tour to end had come and gone. In our class

conversation the next day, one of the students commented on how powerful the experience had been and how it is one thing to read about a place and culture in a text book and an entirely different thing to stand in that place and hear some of its history and stories from someone in the community. We were deeply touched by the experience. Another student said that these stories and experiences would stay with them for a long time.

On a personal note, I will definitely repeat this experience the next time I teach this course and will seek out opportunities to repeat it in other contexts as well. I see how every visit will be different and there is so much to learn."
