
We are always grateful for opportunities like this to welcome guests into the community and share in meaningful cultural exchange.



IONKHINÈN:RINE PROGRAM WRAP-UP



As July comes to a close, so does the first-ever Ionkhinèn:rine Youth Cultural Leadership Program. This exciting new initiative welcomed Kahnawà:ke youth into two immersive two-week sessions filled with hands-on cultural learning and creative exploration.



Participants took part in a wide range of workshops including wampum bracelet-making, beaded keychain crafting, pottery, and moccasin making. Each activity was designed to deepen their connection to culture and tradition while encouraging personal expression and leadership.

The program also featured inspiring guest speakers, including Justin Kingsley and Kimberly Cross, who shared valuable insights and stories with the group.



Each session included two field trips outside the community: the first week featured a visit to Droulers-Tsiionhiakwátha National Historic Site, and in the second week, participants explored the First Peoples sections of both the Botanical Gardens and the McCord Museum.

To celebrate the end of each session, families were invited to a closing BBQ held behind the church in the green space, bringing the community together to honor the youth's achievements and experiences.


2025 ECHOES OF A PROUD NATION POW WOW WAS A HUGE SUCCESS!

The 33rd Echoes of a Proud Nation Pow-Wow, held July 12-13, 2025, welcomed an estimated 12,000 visitors to Kateri Tekakwitha Island. Despite the extreme heat and a late-day thunderstorm on Sunday, the event ran smoothly to several well-received logistical improvements, including a redesigned parking plan and on-island ticketing that significantly reduced wait times. The Pow-Wow- weekend began with a Friday social hosted by KORLCC featured popular Smoke a competition. Over 75 artisan booths and more than 25 food vendors offered a wide variety of products and cuisine, drawing steady crowds throughout the weekend. The event also saw a major boost to the local economy, with over \$80,000 withdrawn from on-site ATMs, much of it spent directly with Indigenous craftspeople and food vendors.

The Pow-Wow Committee were pleased with the turnout and the performance of new infrastructure, despite some minor challenges caused by the sudden storm, which damaged a few vendor setups.

The event maintained its core purpose of cultural celebration and unity, with dancers of all ages and backgrounds filling the arena in vibrant regalia. Artists and vendors noted the value of building new relationships with returning visitors and first-time guests alike. As the powwow wrapped up, the organizers were already planning ahead, hoping to refine logistics even further for July 11 & 12, 2026!








DONOR TOURS

The KCAC Building Committee hosted individuals from the Hewitt Foundation to Kahnawake and the construction site on July 28. We're hoping this visit is the start of a new partnership.

As part of a collaboration between Tourisme Autochtone Québec (TAQ) and Événements Attractions Québec (ÉAQ), a cultural exchange initiative brought together Indigenous and non-Indigenous event promoters. The group attended the Kahnawake Pow Wow on July 12 as the first of two planned events, with the second set for the Festival des traditions du monde in Sherbrooke on August 16. Upon arrival at the powwow, the group was welcomed by Tourism Development Manager, Kimberly, who greeted them and introduced them to the event. The initiative aimed to encourage meaningful dialogue, build connections, and promote the sharing of knowledge and business practices between event organizers from different cultural backgrounds.









August means KBC & Friends Festival at the Kahnawà:ke Brewing Co on Saturday August 16th, 2025, starting at 12h00 to 19h00. Kahnawà:ke will be setting up and once again giving free bus tours of Kahnawà:ke. The event will showcase live music, food & drinks, bouncy house, face painting and lawn games.


